Here is the phonosynthesis of Cornish, as it was in Natural Phonetics $\mathcal{E}$ Tonetics. Unfortunately, in the expansion available from this web site, as number 22.18, it appeared with no figure. Sorry!
22.16. Cornish (Celtic, IE) had six $V$, both short and long (the latter being narrow diphthongs), with different timbres, as well as /a/ [3], besides the seven diphthongs given, two of which (/ai, oi/) occurred in loanwords only. There was phonemic opposition between $/ \theta, \partial /$ and $/ \mathrm{s}, \mathrm{z} /$, as well as between $/ \mathrm{x} /[\mathrm{h}]$ and $/ \mathrm{h} /$ [ f$]$; notice also [ $\mathrm{n}=\mathrm{C}$ ].
